

1. ERASMUS+

The Erasmus exchange program is one of the greatest culture and character building programs that you can have in your whole life. Students who join the Erasmus Programme can study for a minimum of 3 months in another European country. The Erasmus Programme guarantees that the period spent abroad is recognised by their university when they come back, if they abide by terms previously agreed.

Students can study only in partner universities of CTU, for students of MIAS School of Business there is opportunity to study in cities such as Madrid in Spain, Trento in Italy, Aalto in Finland, Augsburg in Germany and many others. A derived benefit is that students can share knowledge and exchange tips/hints with each other before and after going abroad.

A convenience of the programme is that students do not pay extra tuition fees to the university that they visit. Students can also apply for an Erasmus grant to help cover the additional expenses of living abroad. Students with disabilities can apply for an additional grant to cover necessary costs.



2. BILATERAL AGREEMENTS

Spending a part of the study programme abroad is, possibly, the best thing a student can do for their life and career. Studying abroad is a valuable life experience and the growing mobility of students makes it easier to start one's own career in another country if one wishes to do so. The international experience is valued by employers everywhere around the world, moreover, studying abroad may help find inspiration for further specialization or even your thesis.

Czech Technical University in Prague has more than 150 bilateral agreements with foreign universities. CTU is an internationally acknowledged institution that offers a wide range of study programmes, supports research projects and participates actively in networks and organizations. The most popular countries among CTU students are Canada, Australia, Singapore, USA, Japan, Taiwan or Korea.

3. SWISS-MOBILITY PROGRAMME


Switzerland has been suspended as a participant in the Erasmus+ programme as of 2015, following the popular vote to limit the immigration of EU citizens into Switzerland. Therefore, Swiss students will not be able to apply for the programme and European students will not be able to spend time at Swiss universities under the programme.

Swiss-European Mobility Programme is a higher-education programme proposed by the Swiss government, supporting exchange of students and academic personnel.

Exchange for students and teachers is based on bilateral agreements signed for specific study fields between the institutes/schools/colleges and academic units at partner universities.

The initial selection process is carried out by the school, the final decision on accepting the student is made by the partner university.

4. MAGALHAES NETWORK (SMILE)

Rede Magalhães is a European, Latin America and Caribbean Universities consortium created to promote and support the graduate students exchange between that universities. The SMILE-Student Mobility programme in Latin America, Caribbean and Europe allow exchange students to be recognized as students of the host university.

The aim is to increase the academic exchange and collaboration between Europe, and Latin American countries and the Caribbean.

5. CREPUQ

The CREPUQ programme (Conférence des Recteurs et des Principaux des Universités du Québec or Association of Rectors and Principals of Quebec Universities) encourages contact between the cultures of different countries. Student Exchange Programme was established for this purpose with partnerships between Canada and over 500 institutions worldwide.

The Department of External Relations of CTU mediates for its student to study in Canada – province of Québec. A convenience of the programmes is that students do not pay tuition fees at Canadian University. Students also have an opportunity to apply for financial contribution from the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports.
